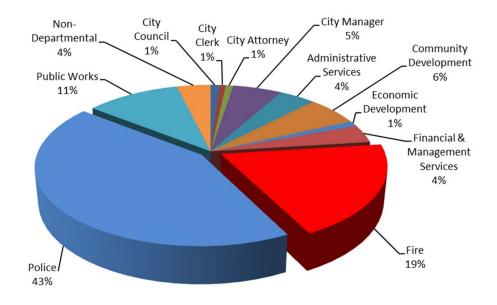

Provide effective public safety services to enhance the Quality of Life for Moreno Valley families and to attract businesses to our community. Public safety priorities focus on:

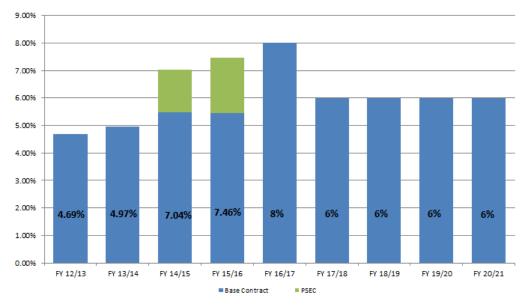

Police Department

Current service levels:

.74 Officers per 1,000 population (incl. Program Overtime)

150 Sworn positions

49.5 Non-Sworn positions



Includes:

450.4 supported hours per day (~93 Deputy Sheriff positions)

Patrol support positions through the contract rate (~62.5 sworn/non-sworn)

44 Dedicated positions

Police Department – Dedicated Positions

- 1 Captain @ \$276,000 (90% share)
- 1 Lieutenant @ \$269,700
- 1 Sergeant @ \$238,500
- 5 Deputy Sheriffs @ \$173,000 each crime/ graffiti prevention
- 12 Deputy Sheriffs @ \$326,500 each motorcycle and K9 teams
- 1 Forensic Technician @ \$130,000
- 20 Community Service Officers @ \$122,800 each
- 2 Office Assistants @ \$74,000 each
- 1 Supervising Office Assistant @ \$88,200

Police Department - Motorcycle Team

Motorcycle Officers (9 + 1 Sergeant)

Each Officer costs \$326,500

Does not include motorcycle, fuel, training, operational costs.

Sergeant costs \$238,500

Total program: \$3.2+ million

Police Department – K9

K-9 Units (3 Teams)

Each Officer costs \$326,500

Does not include fuel, training, operational costs, Vet., kennel, food.

Total program: \$1+ million

Police Department – Proposed Position Changes

Proposed Reductions (non-sworn, dedicated)

1 Forensic Technician @ \$130,000

3 Community Service Officers @ \$122,800 each

1 Office Assistant @ \$74,000

Subtotal \$449,600

Proposed Increases (sworn)

2 Patrol Deputies @ \$326,500 each

For \$203,400:

Add two more Deputies in patrol Increase ratio to .75 Officers per 1,000 residents.

Reassign 1 funded (vacant) position formerly assigned to Task Force (@ \$183.42/hr) to support 1.95 positions via program overtime @ \$80.34/hr:
